PROGRAMMES

To carry out its mission, CFSI has organized activities in the form of five programmes.

Humanitarian Assistance addresses the urgent needs of communities affected by armed conflict and large-scale emergencies, including natural disasters.

Social Development builds local capacity and promotes the physical and psychosocial well-being of vulnerable populations.

Child and Family Welfare protects and promotes the welfare of children and youth, particularly those in exceptionally difficult circumstances and in need of special protection.

Health Promotion supports physical and mental health and prevents disease as well as disability.

Evaluation and Research informs policy and practice and contributes to the knowledge base at the domestic and international levels.

OPERATIONS

CFSI operations in the **Philippines** are multi-faceted, and aim to address the complex realities of armed conflict, natural disasters, persecution, and severe poverty.

At present, much of our work is focused on people affected by armed conflict and natural disaster in Mindanao. In this complex environment, CFSI provides humanitarian assistance and contributes to early recovery, reconstruction, and development.

Since the country is prone to earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, landslides, flooding, and other natural disasters, CFSI provides emergency relief and psychosocial support to survivors. CFSI is also increasingly investing in disaster risk reduction (DRR) in vulnerable communities.

CFSI works across the archipelago to protect refugees, stateless persons, and asylum-seekers from other countries, continuing a record of service since our establishment in 1981.

In Pasay City, CFSI organizes communities to prevent the exploitation of children and youth, and promote their welfare.

In **Myanmar**, specifically Northern Rakhine State, CFSI has worked closely with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) since 1997 to protect stateless people, promote their development, and help ensure their welfare. This expanding operation prioritizes women, children, youth, and includes education, livelihood, social services, and efforts to promote inter-ethnic peacebuilding.

Building on its experience in **Viet Nam** since 1992, CFSI is aiming to reduce vulnerability and promote social justice by enhancing the service capacity of the social work community. CFSI is working with the Ministry of Labour, Invalids, and Social Affairs (MOLISA), the academe, and non-governmental organizations to strengthen social work education and training, and to contribute to social development.

PROFILE

Community and Family Services International (CFSI) is a humanitarian organization committed to peace and social development, with a particular interest in the psychosocial dimension. CFSI was established in 1981 and is based in the Philippines.

The purpose of CFSI is rebuilding the lives of refugees, the internally displaced, disaster survivors, and others in exceptionally difficult circumstances.

VISION

The vision of CFSI is diverse people living in dignity, peace, and harmony.

MISSION

The mission of CFSI is to **vigorously protect and promote human security**, specifically the lives, well-being, and dignity of people uprooted by persecution, armed conflict, disasters, and other exceptionally difficult circumstances.

GOALS

CFSI empowers and equips uprooted people and others in exceptionally difficult circumstances to address and prevent social and health problems. In addition, **CFSI prevents children, women, and men from being uprooted** by promoting peace, respect for human rights, and the equitable distribution of resources.

WHERE WE WORK

Since 1981, CFSI has worked in the Philippines, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, Viet Nam, Cambodia, Myanmar (Burma), Timor-Leste (East Timor), and Papua New Guinea.

At present, we are carrying out operations in the **Philippines**, **Myanmar**, and **Viet Nam**. In addition, we are maintaining a watching brief on Timor-Leste.
